Project outputs	<p>Geographic Area:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Mekarsari village, Cugenang Subdistrict • Wangunjaya village, Cugenang Subdistrict • Sarampad village, Cugenang Subdistrict • Mangunkerta village, Cugenang Subdistrict • Nyalindung village, Cugenang Subdistrict • Cibulakan village, Cugenang Subdistrict • Sukajaya village, Cianjur Subdistrict • Ciwalen village, Cianjur Subdistrict • Bunikasih village, Warung Kondang Subdistrict • Gekbrong village, Gekbrong Subdistrict <p>Humanitarian Activities:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Clean water Facilities: total 96 clean water facilities were established. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ 76 points are sourced from springs and used for daily household purposes, irrigation of rice fields and farm land (for vegetables, etc) which have been rain-fed. ▪ 19 points are sourced at wells, and ▪ 1 point of the PAM pipe that was deliberately hollowed out for the benefit of the community ○ Latrine: 42 emergency latrines/toilets were established. Materials are tailored to local needs, benefits and availability of materials in the Building Shop. This process was done in a mutual cooperation, there must be a septic tank and get approval from District Health Office of Cianjur. ○ Provide 100 hygiene promotion stickers and 100 posters, placed in the toilets and public facilities.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Health and hygiene support <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ 2,000 pcs mask were distributed to the community, in collaboration with District Health Office (DHO), and another humanitarian organisation (Gusdurian Peduli). ○ 1,008 pcs of Vaseline Hypoallergic (support from Unilever), in collaboration with DHO as part of the triggering activities of Community Led Total Sanitation (CLTS). ○ Distribution of 500 pcs of soy sauce to the temporary public kitchen around the camps.
Project impact	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Total 5,671 people as beneficiaries that directly supported by APAD emergency response activities. • With the pattern of community development, community participate and contribute to activities that run on local independence efforts. There is a key person who can coordinate and invite the community to continue to be involved in activities • Collaboration with other institutions so that the community feels the benefits of the program as a whole. • Assistance with the facilitator model so that the community feels the presence of encouragement – cooperation and direction that can be followed by maximum contribution

Lessons learned	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Disaster management requires cross-sectoral and cross-issue collaborative work to accelerate the handling of affected communities. • Disaster management such as the Cianjur earthquake needs to be accompanied by complete education at all levels of society in the context of behavior change and accompanied by strict rule supremacy • It is important that the presence of the Government as a "parent" in disaster situations, considering that this can be a strong encouragement for the community • Despite the emergency situation – certain level of involvement from the impacted community in organizing

	<p>collective efforts was proven effective and increase ownership in carrying out the mission in the field (cleaning up, building temporary latrine etc). This community participatory approach is helping to optimize the funding utilization for the priority needs of the people</p>
Recommendation	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The community remains vigilant about aftershocks that occur and can be felt and residents whose homes are damaged to evacuate to a safe place according to the direction of officers • Affected communities are not easily provoked by irresponsible issues regarding earthquakes and tsunamis. • The need for complete education so that the community no longer builds on soft deposits and land-filling (urug soils) that do not meet technical requirements because they are very prone to earthquake shocks including construction on the bottom, middle and steep slopes that experience weathering considering the potential for landslide movement if shaken by an earthquake. • Cross-sector synergy and integration of existing systems become effective and efficient work patterns in dealing with disaster programs • Community empowerment requires a process /time and needs to consider longer term aspect for its sustainability, for that emergency response efforts need to be followed up with community social programs and engage them as the actor to lead and led to community independence in the future.
